Annex A

#### 1. Bus strategy

Since the November meeting the key emphasis has been on retaining, maintaining and improving existing bus

Concerns were raised over the number 62 bus that has been funded for a year due to end in spring 2025 and now may be under threat. There has been some positive feedback, including responses from the Castleton Public Transport Survey that gave clear indications that the new route should be retained. However, there is a funding gap, in that funding opportunities will not become available until 2026. The Parish Council have written to the County Council to emphasise the need to continue funding and provide some insights from the Public Transport Survey. To support the retention of the service the number of users needs to increase and there is not enough publicity about the service, which is needed to help improve usage and all other suggestions are welcome. We have received a reply from DCC informing us that the service is secure until March 2026 but recognising that passenger numbers need to increase. They have also responded positively to issues raised in our Public Transport Survey.

A meeting will take place with all the parishes linked to the service 62, and Hope Valley Climate action (HVCA), at the end of January to look at a plan of action to action to support the continuation of our only link with Buxton.

Our action group Better Buses for Castleton Group (BB4C) group have also written to DCC and continues to lobby bus operators on changes to bus timetables. A worrying trend are the cancellations to bus routes on the 272 service. In particular the commuter route 06.36 from Sheffield is now no longer running due to low passenger numbers. We have been informed that this is a commercial service, and as such receives no funding from DCC.

National Better Buses Campaign – this group continues to gain momentum and in our neighbouring county, Better Buses for South Yorkshire is working with their mayor to consult with the public as to whether buses should be in public control with a deadline of the 15th of January which is now closed. We anticipate another survey from the East Midlands region shortly.

From a Derbyshire perspective it is hoped that our own and bordering counties will work together on improved transport links. The East Midland Region has received £40 million for buses for 2024/26. Currently Derbyshire County Council organises the Bus Service's Improvement Plan (BSIP). This will now be transferred to EMCCA, by April 2026, under the auspices of the Mayor and Transport lead, Ben Bradley.

The Hope Valley Rail Users Group (HVRUG) sends regular updates on stations on services to the CPC and one of our councillors attends meetings.

Moving Together workshop – This project has been promoted in the village as part of a shared transport project and promotion of E Charging points in the Hope Valley. To date one resident has registered their car for the car sharing scheme. Publicity for this project can.

#### 2. Flood management report

The new flood warning system based upon two river level gauges (at Perryfoot Farm and Goosehill Bridge) went active at the end of November and EA had a drop-in in early December to launch it. A flood warning was issued early on New Year's Day, thankfully not needed, but was useful in raising a few questions for the flood wardens to consider.

Over the last two months there has been some progress on several fronts.

Amongst other things the flood wardens distributed a laminated emergency leaflet to all flood risk properties, have investigated drains (most drains are working well, although there are some that still need attention in various parts of the village and efforts are ongoing), and are looking into improvements in the structure of wall and drains along Waterside. In addition two new emergency helpers and two new possible flood wardens have come forward, and a new flood board for the Waterside path to divert floodwater from properties on the Island has now been produced ready for need, thanks to a resident.

The intention of the parking bays is to create turnover and to cater for the visitor needs to the village as acknowledged above. These bays are not intended to be used by all day commuters working at the businesses and the removal of the limited waiting proposal for the village centre is to cater for this.
	No overnight parking (except for residents & local business staff with permits), to prevent use of spaces for overnight camping so close to houses.	See below with regard to issues with the practicalities of nighttime enforcement. An overnight restriction also would prevent anyone who may be visiting the area and staying locally overnight from having somewhere to park, including visitors to the residential properties opposite who would not be eligible for a residents parking permit.
	Remove one parking bay either side of Goosehill Hall exit similar to that around Peak cavern car park exit.	The removal of two parking spaces here would be a 10% reduction in roadside parking provision along this section of road. The loss of parking space is, of course, a key consideration where parking is already at a premium. The road markings have been laid out to ensure a good width is kept clear at this access and it is considered that, although there are often vehicles parked both sides of the access, that this is not unusual as far as private accesses are concerned across the network and drivers should be able to negotiate this safely when taking reasonable care.

Plan 1 (b) Dunscar Lane to bus turnaround under Mam Tor

Restrict parking in marked bays to 8 hours, allowing time for long hill walks.	There would be issues with the enforcement of an 8-hour limited waiting restriction as the vehicle could only be logged by one CEO, as that individual has to observe the vehicle. So, the vehicle would be logged as the CEO came on shift or when the CEO first observed it being there and that same CEO would have to log the vehicle at the end of the 8-hour period. This would not fit in with the CEO's shift pattern.

A major concern with restricting overnight parking would be the displacement effect of this. Someone turning up to sleep in a van overnight would not just turn round and go back home but would look for somewhere else to pull up for the night and we could end up just moving the demand to other parts of the network. From a Traffic & Safety point of view, the old sections of the Mam Tor Road do not carry any through traffic and there are no residential properties on them so there is no disruption to the flow of traffic or direct impact on residents. In some ways, it could be argued that this is the best place for this type of activity to take place and, if it was restricted, this could move this to other, possibly, less suitable places. From a compliance point of view, enforcement attention would be limited due to the hours that would need to be covered and the probability that a Police presence may also be required. This may lead to abuse of any restriction. Once a restriction is in force, expectations will be for it to be enforced, and resources would dictate that these raised expectations would not be able to be met. Obviously, we are aware of the concerns locally surrounding this issue as are other agencies and there are existing laws in place that can be used to address anti-social behaviours. As you will be aware, there have been a couple of multi-agency meetings to discuss the issues surrounding overnight parking and the situation can remain under review.
